NSS activities we make the students do activities such as cleaning a place, create awareness about various issues like female foeticide etc. But we strongly felt that we should be doing some-thing to improve the shrinking green cover. The ratio at which the green cover is shrinking is alarm-

While we were thinking about how to proceed to achieve our aim, we got the right help from C.L.

Maitreyi, founder-director of Green Earth Life and our alumni association, Rekha

said.

We got requests from people of Ramanagar and other places to make them greener, she said and added

that apart from this they also, collect discarded plastic covers and bottles and other thrash harming the environment.

Maitreyi said that with the help of various school and college students we have been able to make 20,000 seed balls.

"Through our NGO we are attracting students, giving them the needed awareness and together we all join hands to improve green cover," Maitreyi said.

She said that the seeds of species like Soap Nut, Tamarind, Wood Apple, Guava, Honge and other wild species are selected to prepare seed balls as they need minimal or no care and are capable of growing on their own and help the animals and other species.

We have aimed to make the right use of this monsoon and by August from all sources, we are aiming to throw and sow one lakh seed balls, Maitreyi said.
